IS THIS A CW NET FORMING?

Jerry Lee Lewis sang about a "whole lot of shakin' goin' on". We got a whole lot of diddy-bappin' goin' on.

It all started out with Randy (N5KWO) asking for some help with his CW. Naturally, members of an ARRL special services club like B-VARC volunteered to help.

People like Lee Schull (KA5WJB) and Jack Van Demark (WN5A) started meeting Randy on the novice bands. Things have been growing from there.

Now, there are some rules:

(1) no abbreviations:

The code tests don't use them so don't waste time practicing them.

(2) send only as fast as you think you can copy:

Remember, it's okay to say QRS (send slower). But, if you do, send it at the speed you want to receive.

(3) do not send faster than they send to you:

This is harder to do than you think. Think of this rule when someone sends QRS (see rule 2).

(4) wait at least three seconds before you start sending:

This is to give new people a chance to join us after each transmission. If a new person joins in, the next person to send should acknowledge the newcomer, send his code, and then pass to the newcomer so he can have a chance.

(5) Use numbers, punctuation, common Q-signals and procedural codes:

Face it. The numbers and punctuation are a stumbling block for people trying to upgrade. Here is a golden opportunity to get the practice you need.

If you want to join a session, tune us in. Wait for the pause at the end of a transmission. During the pause, send your call signal two to three times. Don't worry about it taking more than three seconds. When (if) we hear you, we will wait to copy your ID.

Bands being the way they are, the next person to send may not hear you. If it happens, don't worry. Just try again at the end of the next transmission.

During the gap before your turn to send, you may hear one or more people try to check in. Identify all those trying to check in, establish who sends after who, and continue.

Needless to say, the rules and these brief explanations don't cover every situation. Well, some things are best tackled on the air.

The fun usually cranks up about 8:00 to 8:30 pm on weeknights (about 10:30 am on weekends). We are staying in the novice bands so everyone can join in.

We have been very successful on 10-meters at 28.200 mHz (as many as six check-ins). We have had a lot of fun on 15-meters at 21.170 mHz. And, we have been on 40-meters at 7.120 mHz.

As you can see ... bands, frequencies, and times are still varying. If in doubt, we try to coordinate on the 145.47 repeater. B-VARC members can reach me by phone because I'm listed in the B-VARC Directory.

ROUND-UP THAT GENERAL

It's been a long row to hoe to Novice and Technician. You've sat through the classes every Monday night ... the radio theory and the code ... oh, the code! The code test found you grappling at every sound, translating the elusive dots and dashes to the alphabet hopefully with enough accuracy to be useful. That five minutes seemed an eternity ... waiting on the VEC team to calmly inform you that you Passed!!!!! With 610 firmly in hand, you hurriedly made a photocopy and speed it on its way to the FCC. Weeks passed before that little white envelope arrived with your callsign and your invitation to GET ON THE AIR!!!!

That first real contact on your own was an eye-opener. Your speed ... what happened to your speed?!?! It seem different now - noise, static and California Kilowatt demons are no help. What can you do? Try voice you think ... but 10-meters is dead and only seems to be up at 3 A.M. or while you're at work. Oh we'll, code-only Novice bands are active. Ah, to be a GENERAL or better, then you'd have more choices (CW and voice, etc).

With a newly acquired determination, you set out to gain your GENERAL license. But how? On your own or with a little help from your friends? Help ... that's it! You call another ham. You're advised that until you get on the air and really get after the code, you'll struggle. Make at least one contact per day and don't abbreviate anything. Use numbers as much as possible. Hams you are "talking" to will catch on and do the some. Don't send any faster than you can receive but do try to increase your speed as you feel more comfortable with the code. But above all else - MAKE A CW CONTACT EACH DAY THAT YOU CAN!!!

I did that and I was getting there, but just not quite. Then the annual ARRL NOVICE ROUNDUP came around. This contest is announced in QST Magazine and takes place in JAN/FEB timeframe. Only Novices and Technicians can place in it. Well, with determination I cranked up the rig and turned around the dial. I figured I'd get some contacts on phone and CW both, but my rig had different ideas. The audio amp went out in the SSB circuit and I was relegated to CW only. After my panic subsided, I found that I could receive CW from everyone I contacted, whether Novice or Extra (you see, even the Extras will slow down for a struggling Novice). But speed, I needed speed! Determined to build it, I worked everything and everyone I could that week. Wow! To my surprise I racked up 165 QSO's and had operating time left. I had worked 44 DX stations!!! That was good enough to be STX Section Leader for 1988! (see Certificate) Was I excited! And my code? Well, the week after the contest I upgraded to GENERAL.

But Novice Roundup is only in JAN/FEB so what now? Get on the air everyday and take the B-VARC GENERAL LICENSING CLASS. It meets on Monday nights 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. And, on Sunday mornings code ragchews are taking place (coordinate on 145.47 mHz at 10:30 a.m.). For more information on the class, contact Stu or Dave.


My notes also show a bill No. 87-14 as the one to support, so please call Harold Parker for more details. We have only 30 days in which to respond, so this must be done quickly!

Proposed By-Laws Amendments

George W. Jolly, ND5E, July, 1988

Introduction

These proposals have been broken into separate propositions, each of which can stand alone, to allow for separate voting.

This is a considerably simplified version of my previous proposal. Ballots are no longer mailed, but are delivered to a membership meeting for counting.

Absence witing is provided by allowing another member to bring your ballotto the meeting for you, but the actual voter and the deliverer must sign the ballot for validation.

By eliminating the mail step, we shorten the time between nomination (or proposal of an amendment) and voting, which should improve things.

Many thanks to all of you for the feedback at the Board meeting and the July membership meeting which made this improved version possible.

Summary of Propositions

Proposition One: To bring the start of officer's term of office in line with present practice.

Proposition Two: To clarify the definition of the Past President Director.

Proposition Three: Proxics 2t Membership Meetings Prohibited.

Proposition four: Proxies at Board of Directors Meetings Determined by Board. They are prohibited unless specifically allowed by vote of the Board each year.

Proposition five: Reform of the Nominating Committee Role, and Provision for absentee voting in elections.

Proposition Siz: Reform of the By-Laws Amendment Process, with Provision for absentee voting. Shorten proposal deadline from 30 days to 21 days.

Proposition One: To bring the start of officer's term of office in line with present practice.

Replace ARTICLE II Section B with:

Officers shall be elected for a term of one (1) year. The term will commence on January 1 of the year following the election. Ceremonial installation of the new officers may be held at a January banquet if desired.

Proposition Two: To clarify the definition of the Past President Director.

Replace ARTICLE IV Section A with

The Board of Directors shall consist of all Officers of the Club, the Activities Chaliman, if any, three (3) elected at large members, and the Past President Director.

Elected at large director positions shall each carry a term of three (2) years. The terms shall be offset one year apart so that each year one at large director position shall expire and stand for election. The elected at large director position shall be elected at the same time, and in the same manner, as the Officers of the Club.

The Past President Director position is an additional at large director position which is not filled by election. The Past President Director shall be chosen by soliciting in reverse chronological order the persons who served as President of the Club prior to the current President. The previous President who served as President most recently, and is willing to serve as the Past President Director, shall be chosen. If none are found, the position will remain vacant.

Replace ARTICLE IV Section B with:

- Vacancies of at large members of the Board of Directors shall be filled by appointees of the Board for the unexpired terms.
- 2. Vacancies of the Past President Director position shall be handled in accordance with ARTICLE IV Section A.

Proposition Three: Proxles 2t Membership Meetings Prohibited

- Replace ARTICLE V Section A Paragraph TWO with:
- 2. Proxies shall not be allowed for any membership vote.

Proposition Four. Proxies at Board of Directors Meetings Determined by Board. They are prohibited unless specifically allowed by vote of the Board each year.

Add ARTICLE V Section G Paragraph Three:

3. The Board of Directors may, by a vote in which proxies are not allowed, establish a policy regarding the use of proxies in Board of Directors meetings. This policy shall automatically expire at the end of the year in which adopted. If no such policy is established, or bestill unexpired, proxies shall not be allowed in Board of Directors meetings.

Proposition Five: Reform of the Nominating Committee Role, and Provision for absence voting in elections.

Replace ARTICLE II Section C with:

Nomination for officers shall be accomplished as follows:

- 1. There shall be a standing nomination committee composed of three (3) members appointed by the Board of Directors. Any member of this committee who chooses to run for an office must resign from the committee. The committee must be filled not later than the regular membership meeting in September.
- The nominating committee shall accept nominations from
 members for each office to be elected. The nominating committice shall advertise the election within the Club and actively
 solicit and encourage nominations. The nominating committee
 shall serive diligently to ensure that at least one nomination is
 made for each position.
- 3. All nominees who are members of the Club and eligible for the office for which nominated shall be included in the slate of candidates. The nominating committee shall offer each nomine the opportunity to decline and be removed from the slate. A nominee nominated for more than one position shall be required to choose one position for which to run.
- 4. Possession of a valid license upgrade certificate to a license class which would make the member eligible to hold office shall be accepted in determining eligibility to stand for election.
- 5. The nominating committee shall choose a cutoff date for nominations to allow publication of the slate to members in the meeting notice for the November regular membership meeting. This notice shall be mailed in accordance with ARTICLE V. Section F of these By-Laws. The slate shall be published in the form of a ballot, and shall include one space per office for a write-in candidate. The ballot shall include space for the member to sign. Family members must each use a separate ballot.
- 6. The ballots shall be counted, and the results announced, during the November regular membership meeting. Ballots submitted after the formal start of counting shall not be accepted. A majority of votes cast is required to win. If necessary, runoff elections shall be held at the same meeting. Only those members actually present may vote in a runoff.
- 7. The ballots must be signed by the voter to be valid. They may be delivered as absentee ballots by another member if the voter cannot attend the meeting, in which case the delivering member shall also sign the ballot. Ballots should not be malted as they would probably not be received in time to be counted.
- 8. Normal quorum requirements shall apply to the election, except that valid signed ballots returned on behalf of absent members shall be counted in the determination of a quorum for the purposes of the election and runoffs only.
- If no candidate be nominated for a given position on the formal ballot, the position shall be decided in the inanner of a runoff. Writesh votes on the formal ballot shall not be accepted for such position.

Proposition Sb: Reform of the By-Laws Amendment Process, with Provision for absentee voting. Shorten proposal deadline from 30 days to 21 days.

Replace ARTICLE IX Section B with:

Proposals for amendments to the By-Laws shall be submitted in writing by a member of the Club to the President of the Club at twenty-one (21) days prior to a membership meeting.

Add ARTICLE IX Section C

Voting on amendments to the By-Laws shall be accomplished at a membership meeting as follows:

- 1. The President shall cause any proposed amendments to be included in a meeting notice mailed to members in accordance with the provision in ARTICLE V, Section F of these By-Laws. The proposed amendments shall be accompanied by a ballot of voting. Each proposition shall be voted either FOR or AGAINST adoption of the amendment. The ballot shall include space for the member to sign.
- The ballots shall be counted, and the results announced, during the designated regular membership meeting. Ballots submitted after the formal start of counting shall not be accepted. A majority of votes cast is required to win.
- 3. The ballots must be signed by the voter to be valid. They may be delivered as absence ballots by another member if the voter cannot attend the meeting, in which case the delivering member shall also sign the ballot. Ballots should not be mailed as they would probably not be received in time to be counted.

4. Normal quorum requirements shall apply to the vote, except that valid signed ballots returned on behalf of absent members shall be counted in the determination of a quorum for the purposes of the amendment vote only.
