B-VARC BOARD MEETING

A quorum of the Board of Directors met at the Sugar Land Community Center on October 3, 1996. This was the tenth board meeting of the calendar year. The meeting was called to order by President, Ron Grimes—WA5SCE, at 7:38 p.m.

The following Board Members and guests were present: Ron Grimes—WASSCE, Louis House—KDSGM, Jackie Burton—KC5OHJ, Jim Cahanin—KBSTBZ, Pete Norns—KJ5SS, Terry McCoy—KK5RL, Bud King—N5UOG, Sam Wilson—N5CPA, John Moore—KK5NU, Mike Hardwick—N5VCX, Harold Parker—ND5F, Vic Richard—N5NAS, Randy Pollard—AK5G, John Dryton—KC5QZD, and KA4JDU.

Recording Secretary, Jackie Burton—KC5OHJ, presented the September minutes. The minutes were approved with a motion that passed unanimously.

Treasurer, Pete Norris—KJ5SS, presented the Treasurer's report dated September 30, 1996, showing a balance of \$4,742.95. The treasurer's report was approved with a motion that passed unanimously. Pete stated that B-VARC currently has a total of 158 members. Pete passed out a memo that he had prepared regarding the state of the treasury. He stated that there was a possibility we should make a motion at the next board meeting to raise the dues. Pete

suggested that everyone read the memo carefully and it will be discussed at the next board meeting. Pete reported that \$74.00 had been collected to send to Newsline and that it would be taken care of in the near future. He also stated that he had checked into the idea of B-VARC putting the money received from life memberships into a savings account. Basically, B-VARC would be allowed an income of up to \$1,000.00 per year without any penalties being assessed or any forms having to be filed. A motion was made by Terry McCoy-KK5RL that we put the money into a savings account. The motion was amended by Bud King-N5UOG to state that as long as the interest doesn't exceed the amount (\$1,000.00) that would change our filing status as a club. Also, that the interest would be rolled into the general fund. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously. Pete stated that he would check on interest rates (shortterm CDS, money markets, savings, etc.) and give a report at the next board meeting.

Vice President, Louis House—KD5GM, stated that he had no volunteer(s) to teach the code classes as of this date.

Board Member, Terry McCoy—KK5RL, had nothing to report.

Board Member, Bud King—N5UOG, stated that it was again time for Halloween night at Sugar Land, and that the price of a booth was \$20.00. A motion was made to send \$20.00 for this event. Bud also stated that a meeting was going to be held regarding the renting of our room at the Sugar Land Community Center on October 10, 1996 at 5:00 p.m. at Sugar Land City Hall. President, Ron Grimes—WA5SCE, stated that he would attend the meeting.

Corresponding Secretary, Jim Cahanin—KB5TBZ, had nothing to report.

B-VARC Rag Chew Net Manager, Sam Wilson—N5CPA, reported that the net is doing well, and that the check-ins for the month of September ranged from 14 to 21.

Public Service Net Manager, Jackie Burton—KC5OHJ, reported that the Monday night Brazos Valley Amateur Radio Club Public Service Information Net was going well, with fairly high check-ins ranging from 35 to 52 for the month of September. She also reported that the squirrel activity seemed to be low, with the exception of one Monday night.

Mike Hardwick—N5VCX, stated that he still needed 5 volunteers for the Alamo Challenge Bike Ride. He also stated that the Houston Symphony Classic bike ride that was scheduled for the same weekend

had been canceled due to lack of riders. President, Ron Grimes—WA5SCE, stated that he had received a report from Scott Pederson—K15DR, that the 20K warm-up shirts will have the B-VARC logo on them. Harold Parker—ND5F stated that there has been a large drop off in the number of people taking amateur radio licensing exams, which could be contributing to a lack of volunteers to work public service events.

In the absence of Allen Mattis-N5AFV, the chairman of the nominating committee, Harold Parker-ND5F gave a report on the slate for the 1997 officers. He stated that no one had volunteered for any of the board positions, but that we did have someone running for each of the positions He stated that Allen available. Mattis-N5AFV would be putting together an article for the newsletter concerning the upcoming elections. He also stated that Claude Sessions—K5HFY would be coordinating the chili supper in November. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned by President, Ron Grimes—WA5SCE, at 8:30 p.m., with a motion, second and unanimous vote.

With the ordinary user doing about 85% of his/her work in the area of the transfer of data and messages via the "information highway", perhaps we next need to direct our focus on the area of the use of the "visual browser" type application. While at the present time Netscape appears to have the fairly largest market share, we should not neglect the other Windows-based applications along the same direction in the form of Mosaic, the "original" visual browser and the latest upstarts in the form of Microsoft's Internet Explorer v3.0 and Global Network Navigator.

As always, your personal preferences and likes should govern the one that you choose to use. It is difficult indeed to please every user 100% of the time, and each of the various flavors of this visual browser family of applications have inherent and built-in capabilities that give to them their own individuality. As the old adage says, you should "try before you buy" and use the one that you feel the most comfortable with. And, as a word of caution, once you get one that you like the look and feel of, stick with it. Cautiously resist the temptation to switch to one then

the other, as you may well find yourself spending endless hours getting familiar with the "bugs and glitches" in that latest and greatest version. Always keep a working backup copy in your personal archives so as to have something that indeed works to fall back on.

And, in the same train, it never hurts to have some alternative form of access other than your primary Internet Service Provider (ISP). Outages and breakdowns in service do occur, when you least expect them or when you find them inconvenient to say the least. At the very least, you should find at least one or two systems that you have accounts established on and that you use regularly enough to keep them active. And, how do you gain access when your local provider is experiencing temporary difficulties? One of your local libraries or universities and schools with a terminal will give you almost instant access to that remote system in El Paso or Denver or Detroit or Tallahassee that you have had the foresight to get an account on. Telnet access will not necessarily be the fastest thing going, but it will serve to give you an account and a mailbox that you can use when it gets to the "must" standpoint.

B-VARC CODE PRACTICE NET

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!!!

This year's 25K Marathon Warm-Up Series Race will be held on Sunday, November 17, 1996, and volunteers are needed to provide communications for the event. Providing communications at a public service event is a lot of fun, and it helps provide a positive image of amateur radio in the community.

For the 5th consecutive year, the 25K race will be run along Memorial Drive, with the start and finish lines being located in downtown Houston. Amateur radio communications have played an important role in previous years. Houston area race directors still talk about the year that a hot balloon landed on the 25K course, just as the race was about to start. The course was blocked, and amateur radio operators were able to notify the race director and delay the start of the race until the balloon was cleared. Amateur radio also played a key role in past years in passing medical traffic. The race covers a distance of 25 kilometers (15.5 miles) and is a serious athletic event rather than a "fun run." In six of the last nine years, injured runners from the 25K race have been taken to the hospital by ambulance.

RFI, EMI AND OTHER STUFF

During the last Novice-Technician class, one of the students noticed an apparent discrepancy scattered throughout the Second Edition of Now You're Talking!. Horror of horrors: A possible error in a League publication? Such an allegation by a yet unlicensed student demanded investigation!

What was this potentially embarrassing issue? In Chapter 3, it is stated that the speed of light (c) is 300,000,000 meters per second (300*10exp6 m/s) in space, and that the electromagnetic waves travel at the same speed. Wavelength is then found from c/f, where f is the frequency of the wave in Hertz (Hz). Several examples follow illustrating the determination of wavelength, building confidence in these notions.

All is still well early in Chapter 7, where we are reintroduced to wavelength. Here we are told the wavelength may be found, in feet, from Equation 7-1, as 984/f (in MHZ). Returning to our original definition, this is equivalent to 300/f(in MHZ), as 1MHz is 10exp6 Hz. Using ! ft.=0.3048m, 300m is about 984 ft. So far, so good.

Later in Chapter 7, the length of a 1/2 wavelength dipole is found, in feet, from Equation 7-2, to be 468/f(MHZ). Now, wanting to demonstrate understanding of our new found knowledge, we divide 984 by 2 to obtain 468. Zounds! The answer is 492, not 468. Picking up a calculator, we obtain the same result! Quickly turning pages searching for an explanation, we find Equation 7-3 for a quarter wavelength antenna which is given as 234/f (in MHZ). Again searching for confirmation the world may not be slowing on its axis, we divide 984 by 4 and obtain 246, not 234! Checking the question pool we find the same discrepancy. Calling another student, it is determined division by 2 and 4 has not changed. So what can the matter be?

As the instructor, I was asked for an explanation. I must admit I could not explain these discrepancies immediately. Research did reveal the answer, however, and an explanation was offered at the next class meeting. What do you think the explanation is? Write me at P.O. Box 1630, Missouri City, TX 77459-1630.

ANTENNA COLUMN


