If you surf the Internet, remember to check out the Ten Ten International web page at http://www.lehigh.edu/lists/tenten-l/. This web page has information about Ten Ten International, as well as many of the Ten Ten chapters throughout the world. The web page contains links to pages maintained by several chapters as well as by individual members.

The Houston SHOT chapter has announced its third annual special. During the month of November, 1996, collect Discovery award upgrade numbers for 2 points each, and Voyager numbers for I point each. List collected points in log format, including call sign, SHOT number, Discovery and/or Voyager number(s), and date worked. Please include your ten ten number, SHOT number and current point value. Your SHOT point value will be increased by one fifth of the points collected during the special. Take advantage of this opportunity to upgrade your SHOT point value outside of the regular chapter upgrade program. Enough Discovery and Voyager upgrades have been issued so that it is possible for SHOT members to more than double their point value during this special.

Paper chasers continue to be active on 28.345 MHz and 28.375 MHz when the band is open. Chapters with specials this month include Houston SHOT (TX), Eagle Watch (AL), and Springbok (DX). The Ten Ten International Paper Chasers Update reports that the Aftershock (CA) chapter has gone ORT.

The trend set the past several months has continued, and propagation on ten meters was not very good during the last month. A few domestic E-layer openings continue to occur, especially in the evening, and a few Latin Americans may be worked with F-layer propagation when conditions permit. We all look forward to propagation on ten meters improving in the coming months as we head into the next solar cycle.

#### B-VARC CODE PRACTICE NET

B-VARC sponsors a Morse Code Practice Net, called BCN, on Monday and Wednesday nights at 8:30 p.m. central time, with the exception of the last Monday of the month. The purpose of this net is to offer a consistent code practice schedule for all amateurs who are working on their upgrades. The practice text is sent at approximately 5, 8, 10, and 13 wpm. The signal type is MCW on the 2m frequency and CW on the 10m frequency. The source of the text is announced in CW before the text is sent. The length of the net is usually 25-30 minutes. Check-ins are welcome at the start of the net (on 10m, check-ins are taken from 8:125 to 8:30 p.m.) Tune in on 146.470 MHz simplex or 28.146.47 MHz CW, with a desire to increase your code proficiency and have a good time.

All copy will come from QST and code generated from a computer text file.

## Meeting of the Board of Directors of The Brazos Valley Amateur Radio Club

November 7, 1996

A quorum of the Board of Directors met at the Sugar Land Community Center on November 7, 1996. This was the eleventh board meeting of the calendar year. The meeting was called to order by President, Ron Grimes--WA5SCE, at 7:36 p.m.

The following Board Members and guests were present: Ron Grimes--WA5SCE, Louis House--KD5GM, Jackie Burton--KC5OHJ, Jim Cahanin--KB5TBZ, Pete Norris--KJ5SS, Terry McCoy-- KK5RL, Bud King--N5UOG, Claude Sessions--K5HFY, Allen Mattis--N5AFV, Sam Wilson--N5CPA, and Rick Hiller--W5RH.

Recording Secretary, Jackie Burton-KC5OHJ, presented the October minutes. The minutes were approved with a motion that passed unanimously.

Treasurer, Pete Norris-KJ5SS, presented a corrected Treasurer's report for September showing a balance of \$4,691.75. He also presented an report for October, showing a balance of \$4,924.30.

He stated that he would be sending a check in the amount of \$73.00 to Newsline. The treasurer's report was approved with a motion that passed unanimously. Pete stated that B-VARC currently has a total of 162 members.

Corresponding Secretary, Jim
Cahanin--KB5TBZ, stating that he
was sending an e-mail reminder
to all B-VARC members with e-mail
addresses of the upcoming elections
at the November meeting.

Vice President, Louis House--KD5GM, had nothing to report.

Board Member, Terry McCoy-KK5RL, had nothing to report.

Board Member, Bud King-N5UOG, stated that the Houston Engineering and Scientific Society (HESS) was moving to 5430 Westheimer. Further information concerning the January awards banquet would be forthcoming as soon as he had more information.

Board Member, Claude Sessions--K5HFY, had nothing to report.

Past President, Allen Mattis--N5AFV, stated that the 25K race was coming up on November 17, 1996, and that he had enough volunteers to handle the event. He also stated that we had a slate of officers for the elections to be held at the November regular meeting. It was suggested by President, Ron Grimes--WA5SCE, that the old board member call their new replacement to give them a rundown of their duties on the Board of Directors. Ron stated that the new board would take effect in January 1997.

B-VARC Rag Chew Net Manager, Sam Wilson--N5CPA, reported that the net is doing well, and that the check-ins for the month of October ranged from 11 to 18. He stated that check-ins seemed to be down.

Public Service Net Manager, Jackie Burton--KC5OHJ, reported that the Monday night Brazos Valley Amateur Radio Club Public Service Information Net was going well, with fairly high check-ins ranging above 50 for the month of October. She mentioned the fact that Newsline was now a long distance call to whoever records it for the net, and that we should discuss how we wish to handle this in the future. President Grimes stated that something was mentioned about this at the M.E.R.A. board meeting, but he couldn't remember what, and after some discussion, nothing was decided.

President, Ron Grimes--WA5SCE, stated that we had 162 paid members, which means that we need approximately 41 or 42 paid members for a quorum at the November election meeting. It was suggested that we divide the roster and have each board member call a page of the roster, reminding everyone to attend the November regular meeting. Jim Cahanin--KB5TBZ stated that he had prepared a sign-in sheet so membership could be verified against the ros-

ter.

President, Ron Grimes--WA5SCE, asked about the status of the Stu Lamkin memorial. It was mentioned that Larry Levy--WD5DRB, was working on this, but no information was available as to the status.

President, Ron Grimes--WA5SCE, stated that he and Bud King-N5UOG had attended the meeting of the Sugar Land Community Center. He stated that there was still no change in our use of the facilities, and that it was still the best deal we could find.

Treasurer, Pete Norris--KJ5SS, stated that he had received information from Compass Bank concerning interest-bearing accounts for our life membership funds. He stated that the money market rate was 3.3%, the 13-month CD rate was 5% and the 5year CD rate was 6%. It was his suggestion that we put the money into the 13-month CD. We have a total of 11 life memberships, which, put into a 13-month CD at the rate of 5%, would yield approximately \$7.75 per life membership. He also suggested that we increase the life membership dues to twenty times the regular annual dues, or \$320.00. He stated that he thought the regular dues should stay the same. He then made a motion to put the life membership funds into a 13-month CD at a bank with the most favorable rate, in any event not to be less than 5%. The motion was seconded and approved with a unanimous vote. He then made a motion to increase the life membership dues to twenty times the annual dues, effective immediately. After much discussion, the motion was seconded and approved.

establish your own 'net connection'.
Returning to our definition of "the
Internet" as a huge and undefined
network of networked computers;
you, the end user, \*have to\* find a
way to get your local computer or
terminal connected into the world
wide network.

Either as a simple terminal connected to one of the other larger and more powerful computers that has a 'real time' connection; where you must do all of your work on the host computer, usually by way of a UN\*X shell account, with all of the intricate and complex commands, most of which seem to be vague and insurmountable to you, as the end user, or, with the aid of a more powerful and sophisticated computer at your end of the link (translated to -more monie\$ expended) that enables you to become, for the length of your session, a node on the Internet, with your very own dynamically assigned IP address, to which all the world knows to be you, while you have that connection up and established.

Again, it is necessary, at least for a customary wire line connection via local telephone dial-up service, to have an account established with a local Internet Service Provider. At last count, there were, here in the local Houston Metropolitan Calling Area, in excess of some seventy five providers of Internet dial-up service. One should of course be aware of the numerous and varied plans and attendant monetary obligations attached to each of them prior to signing up with one. As always, let the 'buyer beware', and know what you are getting for the monies that you lay out. heck with some of your fellow hams that are 'online' and have a handle on the quality of services that are set forth to be delivered. As usual, the lowest cost one \*may\* prove to have some

pitfalls that do not readily appear to the novice user.

However all is not 'doom and gloom' and a forecast of your having to fork over huge sums of monies for a connection. Of course a budget without limitations would be nice, but is really \*not\* necessary. Those folks at The University of Minnesota that brought 'gopher' to the Internet have also produced a shareware program called 'MINUET', for Minnesota Internet User's Essential Tools. This is a DOS based Graphic Internet Access client program with Mail, News, Gopher, Telnet, FTP and Web browser capabilities; it is graphically oriented and mouse driven if desired. And, it has minimum requirements. The program is relatively small in size, in contrast to some of the other commercial applications out; runs on an IBM compatible computer system with 512k of RAM, DOS version 2.1 or better, and works best with a 386 microprocessor and a VGA or SVGA display. It does require a hard drive and a modem of 9,600 baud or better. So it is not really necessary to mortgage the family jewelry or your first born child to get on the 'net'. At press time, details on this program may be found at the following URL's -

Each of these give an excellent summary of the features as well as tips and tricks for installation. 


