



A quorum of the Board of Directors met on the MERA 145.47 repeater on May 1,

1997. This was the fifth board meeting of the calendar year. The meeting was called to order by President, Gailen Marshall -- N4SKR, at 7:30 p.m.

The following Board Members and guests were present: Gailen Marshall -- N4SKR, Terri Van Slyke -- W5BKK, John Dryton -- KM5HP, Nizar Mullani -- K0NM, Jackie Burton -- KC5OHJ, Terry McCoy -- W5TEM, Bud King -- N5UOG, Scott Pederson -- KI5DR,, and Allen Brier -- N5XZ.

President, Gailen Marshall -- N4SKR, asked if any Board Members had received the minutes for the April Board Meeting. Recording Secretary, Terri Van Slyke -- W5BKK, responded that she had not sent the minutes out and that they would be available at the next board meeting. Gailen also stated that Vice-President, Rick Hiller -- W5RH, would not be present for the meeting due to the loss of a friend.

Recording Secretary, Terri Van Slyke -- W5BKK, reported that the picnic went well in spite of cold weather and unplanned change in location. She suggested a picnic in the fall if there was club interest and Board approval. President, Gailen Marshall -- N4SKR, said that he felt that those who attended the picnic had a good time, and a picnic in the fall would be a good idea.

Corresponding Secretary, John Dryton -- KM5HP, stated that the roster had been updated. He said that the next Technical Corner would be presented by Bruce Paige -- KK5DO. President, Gailen Marshall -- N4SKR, mentioned that John

Board Member, Bud King - N5UOG, had nothing to report

Newsletter Editor and Public Service Chairman, Scott Pederson -- KI5DR, reported that he had contacted several other groups including Compaq and NARS to see if there was interest in pooling resources for volunteers for public service events. He said that checking in on nets has not been an effective way to obtain volunteers. He also said that the newsletter needed articles.

Board Member, Bud King -- N5UOG, asked for the current number of paid club members. President, Gailen Marshall -- N4SKR, said he would have that number at the next club meeting.

President, Gailen Marshall -- N4SKR, reported that an audit committee had been formed consisting of : Randy Pollard -- AK5G, Dale Brown -- KC2PZ. and Steve Gottleib -- WA5OEN. He said that Treasurer, Nizar Mullani -- KONM. is getting the necessary information to the committee. He expects to have it certified and presented to the club for approval by the June or July meeting. He also stated that he needed a list of suggestions for the club's vanity call sign. He mentioned that the Board had been polled by e-mail and he had a total of 14 calls for submission. He said that the club is eligible for a 1x2 or 2x1 call because our Trustee, George Jolly --ND5E is an Extra class. He added that if he did not receive any further responses, he would prepare the current list and send it in. Board Member, Bud King --N5UOG, suggested bringing the list to present to the club before submitting it. Gailen said he would bring the list to the meeting Thursday for final approval and get it in the mail by Friday.

Allen Brier -- N5XZ, stated that he had not had time to check into a supplier for B-VARC paraphernalia such as hats and shirts, but he would do so as soon as possible.

He said that there would be a short presentation at the next meeting of specific steps to deal with this problem. He said that plans are being drawn up he believes will be successful in dealing with this problem and encouraged all to come to the next meeting for specific information. He also said that Field Day was less than 2 months away and that Allen Brier -- N5XZ, would be Chairman again this year.

Allen Brier -- N5XZ, reported that he needed to make sure that insurance for Field Day was paid, and he needed an endorsement which stated the event. site, and dates as was done last year. He also mentioned pricing a see through tent which would allow people to watch stations in operation. President Marshall suggested borrowing such a tent from a club member if possible. Allen said he needed volunteers, operators, antennas, campers or mobile homes, and towers. He mentioned a need for a 3 or 4 element tribander, and push up pole. He said had generators, radios, and volunteers to cook. He mentioned that he would cater a barbecue meal as was done last year. He added that B-VARC was 3A last year but may go 2A this year. Stations would include Novice. Satellite, QRP, and Solar Power.

Board Member, Bud King -- N5UOG, suggested listing committees that are open and need volunteers in the next newsletter. He also suggested having an ARRL literature table for 100 extra points on Field Day.

Board Member, Jackie Burton -KC5OHJ, stated that she would not be
able to attend the next Board meeting.

Once again, it's that time of the year to dust off your camping gear and portable radio gear! On June 28th and 29th at the Katy County Park, BVARC will again be hosting Field Day 1997. Katy County Park is located at 24927 Morton Road at the Katy Hockley Cutoff Road in Katy, Texas. To get there, head West on I-10, then turn north on Katy Ft. Bend Road. Take a left Franz Road, then a right on Katy-Hockley Cut Off. Finally, take a right on Morton Road. Katy County Park will be on the right. We will be set up at the pavillion on Ultra Light Drive. Talk-in frequency will be 145.47 Mhz.

Field day is a great opportunity for the new hams with Novice, Tech and Tech + tickets to see HF stations up close and personal and see a contest in operation. In fact, they can even do some of the operating to really see what it's like. It's also a great time to socialize, get some sun, some great food and enjoy some good times.

I am looking for volunteers to help with various aspects of Field Day

in order to make it successful. I need volunteers to help with the following categories: Rigs & Operators; Towers & Antennas; Publicity.

Food (Most Important!), 2-meter Talk-In, Equipment Pick-up (possibly using a U-Haul as we did in 1995). Novice Station, VHF/UHF Stations including packet, Satellite, Solar Power, etc. I will be doing scoring and log submission after the event. Please call me if you can volunteer either as a coordinator or just to help out with any of the items above. We are especially needing help with the following: Food (as I mentioned before), antennas, late night operating (especially CW) and we could also REALLY use a few popup campers or RV's with AIR CONDITIONING!!! Last year, we had two pop-ups and one RV and it sure made operating a lot nicer! Of course. fans would also be appreciated for those operating without such creature comforts. And let's not forget the fun we had with the Novice station. Besides providing bonus points for the club, it helped some of our young hams to get some exposure to HF operating. Don't count 10 Meters out! We made several hundred contacts in 1995 on 28 Mhz.

We can also earn bonus points in the following areas: one message origination (100 pts); message relays (10 pts ea), one satellite QSO (100 pts); five natural power QSO's (100 pts); copying the W1AW message (100 pts); one packet radio QSO (100 pts); and ten VHF/UHF QSO's (100 pts). Note that all satellite, packet and VHF/UHF QSO's are "bonus" points because they do not count as another station, just like the Novice station.

We are planning to cook hamburgers for dinner on Saturday. The club will help underwrite some of the costs of dinner, so please come out and enjoy. Specifics have not yet been determined. After a hard day of erecting antennas, assembling stations, putting up with the heat and insects and making contacts, a good meal really helps alot! We are still looking for help with breakfast on Sunday morning. It's a big job, but certainly one that is appreciated. This year, we're going 2A, which means that we will have two transmitters operating on generator power all the time. We want to set up more transmitters, so that more people have an opportunity to operate. Of course, the Novice, packet, satellite and VHF/UHF stations can operate at any time while any other two HF stations are up.

This gathering provides an opportunity for Houston area ten ten members to meet a number of active ten ten paper chasers from outside the Houston area. The Ten Ten International Convention will be held in Council Bluffs, Iowa on July 10-13, 1997. The annual Paper Chasers Bash will be held August 13-17, 1997 at the Circus Circus Casino and Hotel in Reno. NV. Attendees should ask for a room on the second floor of the Main Tower when they make reservations.

All ten ten members wishing to apply for bars 900 and below are asked to hold their applications until Pescha returns from his travels.

Paper chasers continue to be active on 28.345 MHz and 28.375 MHz during band openings. Unfortunately, the lack of band openings during most of last month has kept paper chasing at a minimum. The Twin Cities (MN) and Steel City (IL) chapters have announced monthly specials for paper chasers to promote activity when the band is open. The Chattanooga Choo Choo (GA) chapter has announced that their Computrain award program now includes a Worked All States award. Ten Ten members were saddened to learn that Jorge Philbert, KA9MX, a local member of the Milwaukee Chapter (WI) has become a silent key.

Propagation on ten meters this past month has improved. E-layer propagation has brought a number of domestic band openings, and DX openings to Latin America and the South Pacific were also reported. During the last week while operating mobile, I

worked stations in Illinois, Alabama, Texas and Argentina. It has been wonderful to see the return of the summer E-layer propagation season.

Remember, the Houston SHOT (Space Houston On Ten) net meets every Tuesday evening at 8 PM local time on 28.488 MHz. All amateurs are welcome to check in, even if they do not have a ten ten number. If you are not a member of Ten Ten International and wish to join the organization, please check in to the net. The following was posted on the Internet recently concerning the future of Ham Radio. The first part is printed this month, with more to follow in next month's issue.

"Concerning the loss of our frequencies. It's going to happen. We will lose them eventually. Who is going to stop it? Just look at our meager numbers. Someone once said that there are safety in numbers, well "we ain't got the numbers". As a matter of fact, the new budget compromise announced by congress last week includes the auctioning off of billions of dollars of frequencies over the next 5 years. Could some of these frequencies be ours? Rudy Hardy WB5UUK, Houston, Tx.

"Bravo Rudy, you have hit the nail on the head.

····

Here are the facts as I see them:

- 1) The amateur radio frequencies are worth in excess of 8 billion dollars
- 2) Utilization of the VHF and UHF frequencies by the hams is less than 5%
- 3) The hams still have that WWII mentality with respect to their hobby and importance
- 4) The average ham is over 40 years old with a majority closer to 50 years old.
- 5) Number of hams has not increased greatly over the last 20 years.
- 6) Hams are no longer contributing significantly to the advancement of technology
- 7) Hams are not building very strong ties with emergency and public service groups
- 8) Hams want to remain exclusive in their hobby

Here is my prediction for the next 10 years

- 1) The LEO s will get a major part of the 2 meters and 70 cm bands
- 2) The Hams will be forced to share a major part of the 2400 MHz band
- 3) Higher UHF frequencies will be targeted for sale off by the FCC

Here is my prediction for the next 20 years

- 1) With the exception of the HF bands, most of the Ham frequencies will be auctioned off
- 2) Hams will be give a token few frequencies on a shared basis
- 3) Spread Spectrum technology will dominate the UHF frequencies

- 4) The number of hams will dwindle down to about a half of the present number
- 5) The older diehard hams will die off
- 6) The younger hams will transition into the Internet
- 7) New ham awards will be created for such things as DXCC-Internet

Sorry brother hams, times are a changing fast and we are not adapting to the changing times. I have enjoyed amateur radio during my growing years and will continue to enjoy parts of it as I get older. But, it does not have the same appeal to the younger people as it used to for us in the 50's and 60's. They have grownup in a different technological era than we did and they are enjoying the net without the hassle of a license or morse code.

- What Frequency Range is it
- Is it dual or triple conversion
- What is the scanner's sensitivity
- What is the scanner's selectivity
- Does the scanner have an attenuator switch
- Pro 4 digit models are base/mobile scanners
- Pro 2 digit scanners are handheld
- Pro 3 digit numbers are shortwave receivers.
- Antenna length for scanner antennas: 2808/frequency in Mhz gives you the whip length in inches.
