



# President's Message for June 1997

Because of him, I have dusted off my MFJ 20M rig, dialed down the power to 4 watts and will be working QRP SSB and CW whenever the opportunity presents (which actually is quite often).

Several national events for members of Ten Ten International will be held during the summer. The Ten Ten International Convention will be held in Council Bluffs, Iowa on July 10-13, 1997. The annual Paper Chasers Bash will be held August 13-17, 1997 at the Circus Circus Casino and Hotel in Reno, NV. Attendees should ask for a room on the second floor of the Main Tower when they make reservations.

The Minuteman (MA) chapter of Ten Ten International reminds all members that they have a slow speed CW net on 28.150 Mhz every Sunday evening at 7:30 PM local time. The net control station is Sonny Cascio - K1SVP. This net provides a good opportunity for members to practice their CW skills, and the summer E-layer propagation will allow many stations from outside MA to check into the net.

SHOT member Bruce Paige - KK5DO had the misfortune of having his house hit by lightning during a thunder storm last month. Bruce's Icom 756, Icom 970, Hy-Gain Ham IV rotor, and the computer in his shack all sustained damage. Bruce's experience should remind us all how important it is that amateur radio operators take precautions to protect their equipment from lightning damage.

Paper chasers continue to be active on 28.345 MHz and 28.375 MHz during band openings. The occurrence of summer E-layer propagation has brought more activity to the band. The Twin Cities (MN), Steel City (IL), Route 66 (IN), and Pirates of the Mississippi (IL) chapters have announced monthly specials for paper chasers to promote activity when the band is open. Ten Ten members were delighted to learn that Gump Gardner - N3GZE was released from hospital after being treated for pneumonia. Gardner is the chapter head of the Fort McHenry (MD) chapter.

Health problems have caused Alice and Paul Jenkins (NR4R and W4UIQ), chapter head and certificate manager of the Chattanooga Choo Choo (GA), Choo Choo Belles (GA) and Computrain (GA)

chapters to suspend the chapters. Alice and Paul will be moving to Florida, and a decision will be made at a later date to either reactivate the chapters, or to declare them QRT. Alice, who has also been manager for the Ten Ten Worked All Counties Award, has turned the county award duties over to Hank Richroath - WA5HWI from Gainesville, TX effective June 1, 1997.

Harry Martemyanov - UN7FZ (ex-UL7FZ) from Kazakhstan has asked Ten Ten members for help. Due to a computer crash, he has lost data about his membership in approximately 150 Ten Ten chapters. Propagation on ten meters this past month has continued to improve. E-layer propagation has brought a number of domestic band openings, and DX openings from Houston to Latin America and the South Pacific were also reported. Stations on the East Coast have reported working Europe. During the past month, I worked stations in AR, CO, FL, IN, KS, KY, MO, OH, TN, TX and Puerto Rico. It has been wonderful to see the return of the summer E-layer propagation season.

Remember, the Houston SHOT (Space Houston On Ten) net meets every Tuesday evening at 8 PM local time on 28.488 MHz. All amateurs are welcome to check in, even if they do not have a

Ten Ten number. If you are not a member of Ten Ten International and wish to join the organization, please check in to the net. There are a lot of exciting activities in Ten Ten, and many friendly people can be found on the ten meter band.

### Public Service Corner

Summer again. It's so hot, no one wants to sponsor a public service event when it's 95 in the shade. So the summer months are usually quiet for we "Public Service Event Hired Guns.."

But what about Field Day? One more reason we stress public service events is it provides a good opportunity to practice our emergency communication skills. What better chance than Field Day? Fortunately I saw a lot of club members out at Katy Park this year, and not just to enjoy the food. Many were operating HF (some for the first time) and getting a taste of how much fun it is, and how difficult it can be sometimes.

Recently I overheard a conversation concerning what would happen if a so called "Real Emergency" occurred. This very smart individual stated their first choice for communicators would be those who regularly participate in PS events.

If you think about it, it makes sense. Here's why:

- Our gear is almost NEVER permanently mounted in anything
- Our antennas are portable and easily adapted to changing vehicles.
- Our radios usually have about 12 ways to plug into power depending on the need and what's available.
- We have lots of experience operating from someplace besides home; in ambulances, portable medical tents, etc.
- We have time-proven experience handling a wide variety of traffic, using multiple radios and frequencies, and not always utilizing repeaters - which are often unavailable in emergencies.

So you see, it is important to exercise your gear regularly (My spell-checker recommended the word "Exorcise"!) by volunteering.

How about operating contests? Starting next month I'm including a section on contests, and wish to include the dates, times, exchange, and rules for each contest. Anyone who works a contest can send me their scores and I'll post them in the newsletter. Highest scoring B-VARC member in ANY contest wins a certificate, to be presented at the December club meeting (I think).

So let's get out there and get active on the bands!
